Purcell Municipal Hospital Community Health Needs Assessment Summary and Implementation Strategy

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Introduction

New requirements for nonprofit, 501 (c)(3), hospitals were enacted under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA), passed on March 23, 2010. One of the most significant of the new requirements is the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) that must be conducted during taxable years after March 23, 2012 and submitted with IRS form 990. A CHNA must then be completed every three years following.

While the requirements are fairly new, the IRS has made strides in defining hospitals that must complete the CHNA as well as details of what is expected in the CHNA report to be submitted. At this time the only entities that must complete the CHNA are hospital organizations defined as:

- An organization that operates a State-licensed hospital facility
- Any other organization that the Secretary determines has the provision of hospital care as its principal function or purpose constituting the basis for its exemption under section 501 (c)(3).

The general goal behind the requirement is to gather community input that leads to recommendations on how the local hospital can better meet and serve residents' needs. The community input is typically derived from a community survey and a series of open meetings. Local health data are presented. Community members then identify and prioritize their top health needs.

After listening to community input, the hospital defines an implementation strategy for their specific facility. The implementation strategy is a written plan that addresses each of the health needs identified in the community meetings. To meet Treasury and IRS guidelines an implementation strategy must:

- Describe how the hospital facility plans to meet the health need, or
- Identify the health need as one the hospital facility does not intend to meet and explain why the hospital facility does not intend to meet the health need¹

After the needs are identified that the hospital can address, the implementation strategy must take into account specific programs, resources, and priorities for that particular facility. This can include existing programs, new programs, or intended collaboration with governmental, nonprofit, or other health care entities within the community.²

The facility must make the recommendations and implementation strategy widely available to community members. The facility must adopt the implementation strategy in that same taxable year.

Oklahoma Office of Rural Health Partnership

The Oklahoma Office of Rural Health makes this program available to all rural facilities in Oklahoma free of charge. The Oklahoma Office of Rural Health works closely with the hospital and community members to develop an economic impact of the local health sector, develop and analyze a local health services survey, and gather and analyze local health data. The community meetings are facilitated by a resource team that includes Corie Kaiser and Lara Brooks of the Oklahoma Office of Rural Health.

After the meetings conclude, the resource team assists the hospital in developing their implementation strategy. After implementation, the resource team will assist in evaluation of the strategies implemented and provide continued assistance with data and resources.

This document discusses the steps taken to conduct a CHNA for Purcell Municipal Hospital in 2022. It begins with a description of the hospital's steps to addressing priorities identified during the 2019 CHNA along with the impacts, followed by a description of the medical service area, including a demographic analysis, and then summarizes each meeting that took place during the CHNA process. The report concludes by listing the recommendations that came out of the process and presenting the hospital's implementation strategy and marketing plan.

This report along with the implementation strategy was presented and approved by the governing board on May 26, 2022.

Previous Community Health Needs Assessment- Priorities, Implementation, and Evaluation

Purcell Municipal Hospital worked with the Oklahoma Office of Rural Health in 2019 to complete their third Community Health Needs Assessment. The previous assessments were completed in 2016 and 2013. During that time, health concerns were identified by community members and then prioritized by community members in focus group-style meetings. The following identifies each priority, implementation taken, and an evaluation or impact of the implementation.

It must be noted that the Covid-19 pandemic greatly impacted the implementation of some of the priorities and outreach opportunities during 2020 to present.

Area of concern: Access to primary care including increasing the number of providers

Activity 1: Purcell Municipal Hospital hired a full time nurse practitioner. This additional provider has added more primary care visit options to the community and benefited 2,063 individuals.

Activity 2: A physician was added through the SSM network who is included in the SSM Family Clinic in Purcell. 1,100 number of individuals have benefited from the addition of this provider.

Activity 3: A surgeon was also added through the SSM network who visits twice per month for procedures and consults. To date, 604 number of individuals have benefited from this addition and did not have to travel outside of Purcell for care.

Purcell Municipal Hospital Medical Services Area Demographics




Figure 1. Purcell Municipal Hospital Medical Service Areas

Figure 1 displays the Purcell Municipal Hospital medical services area. Purcell Municipal Hospital and all area hospitals are delineated in the figure. The surrounding hospitals are identified in the table below by county along with their respective bed count.

As delineated in Figure 1, the primary medical service area of Purcell Municipal Hospital includes the zip code areas of Purcell, Lexington, Maysville, Paoli, Wayne, Wanette, Blanchard, Lindsay, Pauls Valley, Elmore City, Washington, and Noble. The primary medical service area experienced a population increase of 15.7 percent from the 2000 Census to the 2010 Census (Table 1). This same service area experienced another population increase of 6.2 percent from the 2010 Census to the latest available, 2016-220, American Community Survey.

The secondary medical services area is comprised of the zip code areas of Byars, Alex, Newcastle, two Norman zip codes, Macomb, Asher, Stratford, and Wynnewood. The secondary medical service area experienced an increase in population of 10.8 percent from 2000 to 2010 followed by another population increase of 9.2 percent from 2010 to the 2016-2020 American Community Survey.

Hospital administration utilized most recent discharge data by zip code to delineate the primary and secondary medical service areas. In particular, administration examined the previous discharges, and the zip codes who had at least 1,000 discharges were deemed as primary while those with 500-1,000 discharges were identified as secondary.

Table 2 displays the current existing medical services in the primary service area of the Purcell Municipal Hospital medical services area. Most of these services would be expected in a service area of Purcell's size: four physician offices, five dental offices, two optometry offices, one chiropractic office, four nursing homes, four home health providers, one EMS provider, two rehabilitation and physical therapy providers, one assisted living facility, a county health department, one mental health and counseling provider, one community health provider, and five pharmacies. Purcell Municipal Hospital is a 39 bed facility located in McClain County. The hospital provides emergency room services, radiology (CT, Ultrasound, X-ray, Nuclear Medicine, Fluoroscopy, Diagnostic Radiography Services, Bone Density), walk-in/after hours care, Advanced Cardiac Life Support and Pediatric Advanced Life Support. Outpatient services include a specialty clinic and surgery. A complete list of hospital services and community involvement activities can be found in Appendix A.

In addition to examining the total population trends of the medical service areas, it is important to understand the demographics of those populations. Table 3 displays trends in age groups for the primary and secondary medical service areas as well as McClain County in comparison to the state of Oklahoma. Overall, the over 65 age group has experienced an increase in population across all geographies from the 2010 Census to the latest, 2016-2020 American Community Survey. This cohort accounted for 15.7 percent of the total population at the state level. In terms of the medical service areas, this age group accounted for 16.2 percent of the primary medical service area, 15.8 percent of the secondary medical service area, and 15.4 percent of the population of McClain County. The 45-64 age group accounts for the largest share of the population in the primary (26.2%) and McClain County (26%). This is compared to the state share of 24.2 percent of the total population.

Changes in racial and ethnic groups can impact the delivery of healthcare services, largely due to language barriers and dramatically different prevalence rates for specific diseases, such as diabetes. A noticeable trend in Oklahoma is the growth in the Hispanic origin population. In 2010, those of Hispanic origin accounted for 8.9 percent of the total state

population. The latest American Community Survey data of 2016-2020 suggest that this population group has experienced an increase to 10.9 percent of the total population. This trend is also evident in McClain County and both medical service areas. The share of the population identified as of Hispanic Origin accounted for 8.3 percent of the primary medical service area's population in 2016-2020 and 5.6 percent of the secondary medical service area during the same time period. The Hispanic Origin population accounted for 8.2 percent of the total population from 2016-2020 in McClain County.

Summary of Community Input for CHNA

. In an effort to promote social distancing and following recommendations outlined the CDC's website, the hospital hosted one single community meeting to gather community feedback. The meeting was held on April 7, 2022 with 14 community members in attendance. All stakeholders received all of the typical primary and secondary data prior to their respective meetings. The meeting presentations and handouts can be found in Appendices C-E. The Oklahoma Office of Rural Health facilitated the gathering of the secondary data, the completion of the survey, and the community meeting. Data summaries are provided in the following sections.

A hospital representative reached out to different providers in the area including local education systems, banks, churches, DHS, McClain County Health Department, Chamber of Commerce and a local insurance agent. The individuals invited were sought due to their extensive knowledge of the needs of Purcell and the greater medical service area. Hospital employees who are active in local civic organizations and the school were included since they have a broad understanding of the community. A specific focus was placed on those from the public health sector to provide insight into what they see from a public health and underserved population perspective of community needs.

Economic Conditions of McClain County and Economic Impact of Health Sector

Economic indicators for McClain County in comparison to Oklahoma and the United States are outlined in Table 5. McClain County tends to somewhat mirror Oklahoma and slightly lag the United States in many of the economic variables. In terms of per capita income, or the total income divided by the population, McClain County is comparable Oklahoma and less favorable than the nation. Oklahoma as a state tends to lag the national average. In terms of employment and unemployment, there were many changes during 2020. The 2020 annual unemployment rate for McClain County was 5.5 percent. This rate is lower than the state (6.1%)

and the national (8.1%) rates. All of these rates are non-seasonally adjusted. The most recent monthly estimates show McClain County to be lower than 2020 with a 1.4 percent rate. This is lower than the state (1.8%) and national (3.7%) rates. The share of individual captured below the poverty threshold for income and household size is calculated by the U.S. Census Bureau. In 2020, the poverty rate for all ages in McClain County was 10.4 percent. This is lower than the state and national rates. The share of children, or those under the age of 18, followed the same trend of being lower than both the state and national rates. All economic indicators can be found in Table 5.

Table 6 displays various education variables for McClain County. The first three lines are education attainment percentages for the population aged 25 years and greater. In McClain County, 90.1 percent of the population has at least their high school diploma, 57.3 percent has at least some college, and 25 percent of the population has at least a bachelor's degree. The farright handed column provides a ranking within the state based on the highest, or most favorable percentages. The free and reduced lunch rate is the share of children in McClain County who are enrolled in public school and eligible for free and reduced lunches. McClain County's rate is 40.8 percent. This is lower than the state average of 53.2 percent. This is lowest rate in the state.

Table 7 includes payer source data for McClain County residents in comparison to the state. A ranking is also provided with the lowest percentages as the more favorable ranking. In 2019, 14.4 percent of individuals under the age of 65 were categorized as uninsured. This is lower than the state rate of 16.8 percent. In terms of children, or those under the age of 19, this rate was 8.8 percent. This was also higher than the state rate of 8.6 percent. In 2019, 18.8 percent of the population had Medicare as a payer for healthcare. This includes Medicare parts A, B and Advantage. In terms of Medicaid, 21 percent of the population in McClain County had Medicaid as a payer source. The Medicare and Medicaid data were gathered from different sources, and duplicates have not been removed.

Table 8 below summarizes the overall economic impact of the health sector on the McClain County, Oklahoma economy. Local providers were asked to share their employment levels and of those employees how many were physicians/optometrists/dentists/pharmacists/etc. When available, payroll information was also collected from the establishments. When payroll information was not available, payroll was estimated using state level averages from the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The health sector in the Purcell Municipal Hospital medical service area employs 611 FTE individuals. After applying a county-specific employment multiplier to each respective sector, there is a total employment impact of 816 FTE employees. The same methodology is applied to income. The local health sector has a direct income impact of over \$33.3 million. When the appropriate income multiplier is applied, the total income impact is over \$39.4 million. The last two columns examine the impact this has on the retail sector of the local community. Recent data suggest that just 23.6% of personal income in Oklahoma will be spent on taxable goods and services locally. Therefore, if we just examine the impact made on retail from those employed in the health sector, this would account for over \$9 million spent locally, generating \$93,191 on a 1% tax. A copy of the meeting materials that were distributed can be found in Appendix C.

Health Data

Various sources of health data were examined including data from the County Health Rankings and Roadmaps Program through the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, and the Robert Woods Johnson Foundation. The County Health Rankings program evaluates and ranks counties based on two distinct areas: Health Factors and Health Outcomes. Along with these two areas counties receive an overall rank within their state; therefore 1=best and 77=worst.

Health factors, considered tomorrow's health, are comprised of health behaviors (rank: 12), clinical care (rank: 11), social and economic factors (rank: 3), and physical environment (rank: 59). McClain County's overall health factors rank is 5. This suggests, in general, the health status of McClain County residents is somewhat comparable to that of neighboring counties. Areas of concern include McClain County's smoking rate, obesity rate, excessive drinking rate, and uninsured rate are all less desirable than the top U.S. performers. All health factors variables are presented in Table 9 along with McClain County specific data, the top U.S. performers, and the state average. The yellow highlighted categories are the areas identified by the County Health Rankings and Roadmaps as areas to explore (generally where McClain County ranks poorly compared to the national benchmark). The green highlighted areas are identified by County Health Rankings and Roadmaps as areas of strength for McClain County.





Community Survey Methodology and Results

A survey was designed to gauge hospital usage, satisfaction, and community health needs. The survey link was made available on the hospital's website, Facebook page, the Purcell Register's Facebook page, City of Purcell email list, Chamber newsletter and employee email list. Hard copy surveys were distributed at local clinics, the McClain County Health Department and the public library. A copy of the survey form and results can be found in Appendix E. Community members were asked to return their completed surveys to Purcell Municipal Hospital.

The survey ran from February 6 to March 17, 2022. A total of 162 surveys from the Purcell Municipal Hospital medical service area were completed. Of the surveys returned, all were completed via Survey Monkey.

Table 11 below shows the survey respondent representation by zip code. The largest share of respondents was from the Purcell (73080) zip code with 100 responses or 61.7 percent of the total. Wayne (73095) followed with 10 responses, and Lexington (73051) had 8 responses.

The survey focused on several health topics of interest to the community. Highlights of the results include:

Primary Care Physician Visits

- 63% of respondents had used a primary care physician in the Purcell service area during the past 24 months
- 91.2% of those responded being satisfied
- Only 35 respondents or 21.6% of the survey respondents believe there are enough primary care physicians practicing in the Purcell area
- 59.9% responded they were able to get an appointment with their primary care physician when they needed one
- 46.3% of respondents indicated that they have used the services of an urgent care in the past 12 months
- 67.3% responded that they would utilize urgent care or after hours services offered in Purcell

Specialist Visits

Summary highlights include:

- 63% of all respondents report some specialist visit in past 24 months
- Most common specialty visited are displayed in Table 12
- Four visits occurred in Purcell



Hospital Usage and Satisfaction

Survey highlights include:

- 51.7% of survey respondents that have used hospital services in the past 24 months used services at Purcell Municipal Hospital
 - Norman Regional Hospital, Norman (14.6%) and Norman Regional Healthplex, Norman (7.9%) followed
 - The most common response for using a hospital other than Purcell Municipal Hospital was availability of specialty care (including surgery and labor and delivery) (32.3%) and physician referral/Transferred (28.3%)
 - The usage rate of 51.7% was lower than the state average of 55.9% for usage of other rural Oklahoma hospitals surveyed
- 87.4% of survey respondents were satisfied with the services received at Purcell Municipal Hospital
 - This is at the state average for other hospitals (87.1%)
- Most common services used at Purcell Municipal Hospital:
 - o Laboratory (30.2%)
 - o Physician Services (27.1%)
 - o Diagnostic Imaging (X-ray, CT, Ultrasound, MRI) (20.6%)

Community Health Needs-Identification of Priorities

As mentioned previously, due to COVID-19, a series of community meetings were not able to be held to present data and gather data in a town-hall style meeting. Instead, a single community meeting was utilized to gather community input. A meeting of community stakeholders was held on April 7, 2022. The OK Office of Rural Health presented and facilitated the meeting. A complete listing of individuals who participated is included in Appendix B.

During the community meeting process, participants were asked the following three questions:

- What are the top health needs of the patients/clients I serve?
- What are the top health needs of the greater community (outside of the hospital or clinic setting)?
- What am I most proud of in the Purcell community?

The concerns listed were:

- Access to wellness and activity- Community is wanting Silver Sneakers- they do have the Chickasaw Nation Wellness
- Homelessness in town
- Hispanic population could not be represented in the Census, completing the Census- this could impact poverty
- Possible free and reduced lunch rate in Purcell, poverty rate in Purcell. The school has a backpack program that is heavily utilizing. The elementary has 30 families weekly. There is a local food pantry.
- Rising inflation, cost of groceries, nutrition, accessing foods, senior population, convenience and cost- impacts those on fixed incomes and generally all populations
- Mental health- Accessing services, a good share of the population needs counseling services and care- Becoming a larger issue to make sure people are taking care of themselves- There is a long wait list for local services- few crisis services.
 - Patients will go to metro area for care and local police will help those at the school to find beds/care. Statewide issue in finding beds. St. Anthony's facility is almost always full with patients.
- People are leaving community for specialty services- there has been an increase in specialists available, but the spots fill up quickly
 - Specialist visits are referred by their PCPs
 - Those leaving community could increase on Medicaid for finding providers
 - Purcell does have 24 hour physician ED coverage with emergency medicine is their specialty

- DHS office closed, the online option to fill out services can be challenging. There is a need for a social worker or DHS employee at the hospital to take walk-ins to help.
- Urgent care or after hours care- The hospital is looking to expand hours- need to market the services available (2)

Purcell does have many strengths. Some of the sources of pride noted by community members include:

- Chickasaw Nation's wellness center- opened in 2019- open to community- starting to see numbers increase again
- New Hospital Opening- September 2022
- Lake area- free opportunities, walking trail and enhancements, disc golf
- Community outreach- there is always someone available to help
- Good community support

Purcell Municipal Hospital Administration utilized these responses to generate the list of priorities based on the frequencies of responses, potential impact the hospital can have on these items, and the opportunity to collaborate with existing organizations and providers in the community. The following items were identified as priorities:

- DHS office closed, the online option to fill out services can be challenging. There is a need for a social worker or DHS employee at the hospital to take walk-ins to help.
 - The hospital understands this concern. The hospital will explore options for greater follow up with patients who are self pay in the emergency room. They can then assist patients in completing necessary paperwork to enroll in Medicaid.
- Urgent care or after hours care- The hospital is looking to expand hours- need to market the services available
- Access to wellness and activity- Community is wanting Silver Sneakers- they do have the Chickasaw Nation Wellness
 - The hospital will work to develop a greater collaboration with the Chickasaw Nation's Wellness Center. The hospital and clinic can assist by making referrals to the Wellness Center for patients for physical activity.
- Mental health- The hospital and clinics have screenings in place for mental health needs.
 The patients identified at risk could then receive greater case management/linkage to outpatient counseling resources through their payor source.


